

An article on the front page of *The Asheville Citizen-Times* of September 17, 1922, described a new development called Great Smoky Mountain Club, Inc.

George Masa was hired to photograph the property. The inventory list at Ramsey Library shows he captured 18 views numbered 0-524 through 0-541. According to an article in *The Asheville Citizen-Times* of November 5 1922 (page 12): "Massa [sic] has just returned from Crestmont, where he made photographs for the Great Smoky Mountain Club, one of the largest clubs in the Appalachian region, which is now being developed."

VAST ACREAGE IS BOUGHT AS SITE FOR HUNTING CLUB

\$700,000 Is Involved in Deal by Davidson, Rumbo and Buckner.

With the receipt of a charter for The Great Smoky Mountain Club, Inc., by Asheville men yesterday, it became known that General Theodore F. Davidson, James Edward Rumbo and N. Buckner have purchased and obtained control of 35 square miles of land in Haywood County for the purpose of forming one of the greatest hunting and camping clubs in the entire country. The proposition involves approximately \$700,000.

The land, some 22,000 acres is located in Haywood County including a part of the Great Smoky Mountains as the northern portion; the Mt. Sterling range on the southeast; the Balsam range on the south and the Smokies on the west. The railroad point to serve the boundary is at Crestmont.

Much of the territory is covered by virgin timber and abounds in game, including small black bear, foxes, grouse, pheasants and a few deer, according to the incorporators.

The incorporators will meet here the first of the week at which time an organization will be perfected. It is understood General Davidson will become president, Mr. Rumbo, vice-president, and N. Buckner, secretary-treasurer.

Construction of hunting lodges, a club house, an 18-hole golf course, a 35-acre lake, stocking of the preserve with deer and many improvements will begin at an early date, according to the plans of those promoting this big undertaking.

The lake will be so constructed as to furnish water power for an electric generating plant, that a modern lighting system can be had, even though the preserve is in the center of great mountain ranges averaging an altitude of 4,000 and which are practically uninhabited.

Sixty miles of trout fishing in Big Creek and its tributaries make one of the most attractive features of this big preserve, the streams having already been stocked and protected.

The clubhouse, lodges and camping sites will be in a valley

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which is almost completely surrounded by towering peaks and which is entered through a pass about one-fourth of a mile wide, from Crestmont.

It was at Crestmont that a lumbering operation was carried on for some time and the former site of the lumber mills and camps will comprise the central location of the lodges for the preserve.

Membership in the club will be limited to 1,250, it has been announced, and each will be worth several hundred dollars. Associated with the incorporators is James E. Rector, Asheville attorney, as corporation counsel.

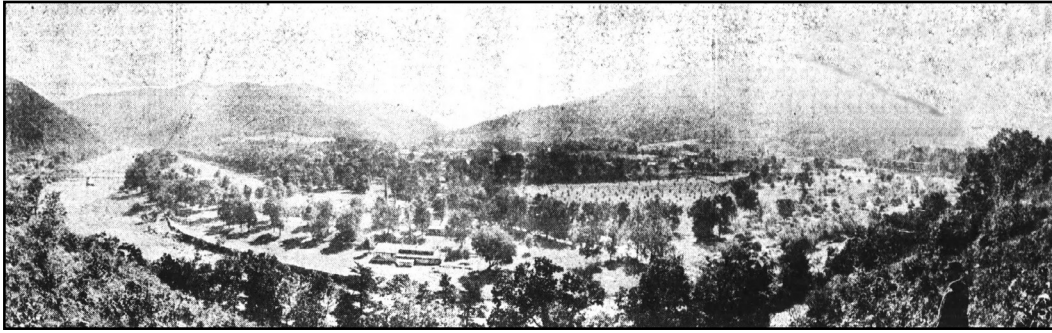

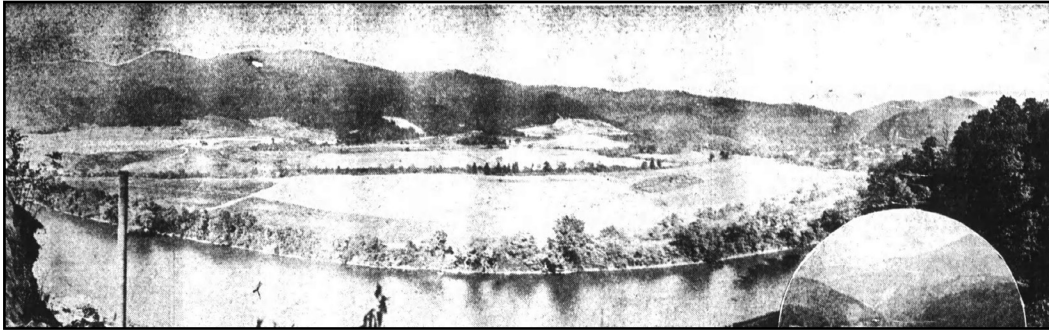
